### **Winter Reminders**

Winter can be the most difficult time for bees. This is the time of year when most losses occur. Don't forget to feed bees if honey supplies are low. According to Beeworks, a queen in her second season has a 50% chance of failing during the winter. They recommend requeen in the fall. They also

mention the need to ventilate the hive during the wettest time of the year. Warm air condenses on cold surfaces which forms ice, thus melting during the warmer days, dripping water on the cluster. Wrapping the hive in black tar paper can help keep the hive dry, and prevents additional wetting of the hive

sides. The Beeworks author noted the only time he lost hives (in 19 years) was the one time he did not wrap a few of his hives. He noted those wrapped were thriving, while the unwrapped hives were failing. More information go to: http:// www.beeworks.com
