July Program Dr. Caron's Special Presentation

President's Message

We've plunged headfirst into the heat and dry of a Pacific Northwest summer and I don't think we can count on anything being "normal" with our bees this year. "Earlier than usual" seems to be the working mantra. Making sure your bees have a water source is critically important; they need the water to cool the hive. We'll have to see what happens to forage in August.

There is lots happening in the local bee world. The Panorama-hosted pollinator garden dedication and campaign launch was wellattended and beautifully set up by the wonderful folks at Panorama. We are very grateful to Joe DiSanto, president of Panorama and his team that provided the tent and seating, PA system and wonderfully delicious and elegant refreshments. We were honored by the presence of so many fabulous guests and smiling faces that turned out for the evening program. Senator Karen Fraser helped with the Nikki McClure sign "big reveal" as did Thurston County Commissioner Sandra Romero. WA State Beekeepers Association (WSBA) president Mark Emrich presented recognition certificates to the Nisqually Land Trust, the cities of Olympia and Tumwater, Lott Clean Water Alliance and to Patrick Soderberg, of Thurston County's pesticide arm in recognition of their commitment to help protect pollinators. Sally Vogel, of Panorama's Green Team relayed the story of the pollinator garden's genesis and purpose and then Green Team members dedicated the garden with a symbolic dousing of watering cans filled with organic fertilizer. I was honored to be able to address the group about the importance of our honey bees, the problems they (and we) are facing and how each of us can do something to act in the protection and conservation of not only bees, but all the pollinators currently facing the same threats and fate. It was a great kickoff and many thanks to Tricia Shaw, Joanie Offord, Dixon Fellows (who brought the observation hive), Duane McBride, Becky Emrich and Paul and Penny Longwell for their help with set-up, manning the tables and for making it such a successful event. It was also fabulous to see

Another important bit of news is that the Senate Bill 6057 was signed by Governor Inslee on July 1st. Tim Hiatt, a commercial beekeeper on the eastern side of WA state and WSBA legislative committee member who's been working on beekeeping leg issues, sent notice of the signature on July 2nd. SB 6057 was not a beekeeping bill, although Part XI was, basically, our SB 5017 which asked that beekeepers be recognized as agriculture and therefore, eligible for the same tax exemptions as other state agriculture pursuits. He invited everyone to help craft the National MP3 Program (Multiple Pollinators Protection Program). It will be administered through the State Department of Agriculture and will be strictly for pollinators. We will be joining with several states to formulate plans and will be sharing in the work of submitting the plan.

Mark touched on the state education plans. We are working on finding Journeyman who can teach. By July 1 we plan to go paperless with access to our entire curriculum online. This will be helpful to rural beekeepers who do not have access to a club or instructors.
