September 14, 2015 Call to order at 7:08 p.m.

Welcome to new members!

Laurie asked for corrections to the August 2015 minutes. None were offered and they were accepted as written.

#### **Old Business**

Nisqually Watershed Festival is coming up on September 26<sup>th</sup> from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Thank you to all of the folks who volunteered at our last meeting!

Membership dues will be accepted during our meeting tonight.

#### **New Business**

As reported at the last county commissioner "bee team" meeting, there is a new sign that is being installed at the Hazo House in Olympia to "Bee Friendly to Pollinators". A photocopy of the sign was shown. We will work towards getting a picture of the actual sign in place at the Hazo House to post on the website and send them a note of thanks for taking action on behalf of pollinator awareness.

Laurie met with the new director of the Washington State Department of Agriculture, Mr. Derek Sandison last week along with Mark Emrich and Franclyn Heinecke of Pierce County. They discussed outcomes of the Honey Bee Working Group Report and the needs for bee forage. He was receptive to concerns and continues to become acquainted with his new role.

On October 3<sup>rd</sup> our officers will be meeting with Lewis and Pierce county beekeeper association officers to discuss possibilities for future collaborations. They may well be joined by other organizations who are interested.

We have a brand spanking new, still in the box, deluxe extractor and electric uncapping knife donated to the club by Mr. John Bates! A thank you card was passed around in recognition of such a fantastic gift to the club.

Our next meeting will be held on the third Monday of October instead of the second because it falls on Columbus Day. The meeting date is October 19<sup>th</sup>.

Laurie presented the Mark Savage award with apologies that the shiny new smoker upon which the engraved plaque is to be mounted had yet to arrive. Gail Booth accepted her award, proudly stating that it didn't matter that the plaque was not yet on a new smoker! A temporary smoker was presented until the proper piece arrives.

Laurie Pyne accepted with gratitude the club's Beekeeper of the Year award!

There was a call out for a queen by Frank Scolaro who needs one desperately. Suggested was Beeline in Rochester and Lori Miller in Roy.

### **Chair reports**

**Jim Rieck** says this is a good time to look for a mentor for next year. See him during the break if

you are interested in becoming a mentor or would like to work with one!

**David Bruun** reported on plans for the upcoming Christmas party. There will be a Hive of the Year award as well as a honey judging (as well as tasting for members) by Bob Smith. Everyone is invited to compete.

Paul Longwell apologized that the books from our library were not at the meeting. We have received sooo many new books that the container broke! He is in the process of building a new display case. Paul also announced that he has been appointed to the Thurston County Fair Board and will be working toward allowing us to sell products at the fair. Congratulations to Paul!

Michele Linehan noted that the borrowing and returning of hive equipment is running smoothly and all equipment is coming back clean. She says that she is often in Tacoma overnight and that her husband has become handy at knowing where things are and where they go when returned. She asked that people returning or borrowing please give advance notice so that proper prep can be made to make sure someone is there to assist with the equipment.

Mark Emrich spoke to the club reporting that October 11<sup>th</sup> will be his last official day as Washington State Beekeepers President. He thanked the club for their support stating that "this is where I got my start." He plans to

nominate Laurie Pyne as the Washington State Beekeeper of the Year.

He encouraged members to attend the State annual meeting that is coming up October 11 in Ellensburg. There will be various meetings you can participate in and make some new beekeeper friends. You can learn about beekeeping on the east side of the state, which is a whole different beast than beekeeping here in the west.

Mark has been appointed as Chairman of the Pesticide and Noxious Weed Board for Thurston County. Get in touch with Mark if you have concerns regarding noxious weeds or spraying.

Laurie Pyne announced that there was big news for beekeepers as a lawsuit was won against Dow for not acting in good faith and testing their product adequately! A U.S. appeals court ruled that federal regulators erred in allowing an insecticide developed by Dow (sulfoxaflor) onto the market, canceling its approval. The lawsuit was filed in 2013 by organizations representing the honey beekeeping and honey industry.

Ron Scholzen gave a brief report on a new substance that is helpful in treating bee stings. His Chiropractor (whom he turned on to beekeeping) uses this capsule that goes under your tongue and dissolves. It is called Apis Melifica and can be found The Olympia Food Coop and possibly local health food stores. This is not a substitute for an epi-pen, but is good for people who are starting to have mild reactions to bee stings.

**Becky Anderson** says that there will be a meeting at the club apiary this Saturday at 1:00 p.m.

• **Glen Buschmann** reported that a group will meet at the Olympia Timberland Public Library to discuss native pollinators. The meeting will be on September 28<sup>th</sup> from 6:00 p.m. to just before 8:00 p.m. The plan is to decide if there is enough interest to establish a permanent group to study native pollinators and meet on a regular basis.
